BENT ARROW

Arrows have been used in all parts of the world for millennia. They are very effective tools in the hands of archers and sportsmen. When released from the bow, they can fly at speeds of over 200 mph and strike targets over a distance of 400 yards or more. Swift, silent and effective weapons for the skilled hunter.

But with use, some arrows become bent. Some may try to bend arrows back to being straight, but this is generally not advised as even slightly bent arrows can be unsafe, fly erratically, stray from targets and can even damage the bow or string. So...who wants to use a bent arrow? Well, in a way, it appears that God does.

In the back of my Bible, there

is a map with arrows showing the path of the Israelites after their deliverance from Egypt. In part of their subsequent journey, it shows them flying straight as an arrow from the wilderness and towards Canaan, the promised land. But then, the path of their arrow bends, and heads back into the wilderness. Why? Because after the Israelite spies went in to see the promised land and report on it, the people doubted the Lord. As the Lord stated in Num. 14:22-24, "Because all those men which have seen my glory, and my miracles, which I did in Egypt and in the wilderness, and have tempted me now these ten times, and have not hearkened to my voice: Surely they shall not see the land which I sware unto their fathers, neither shall

any of them that provoked me see it: But my servant Caleb, because he had another spirit with him, and hath followed me fully, him will I bring into the land whereinto he went; and his seed shall possess it."

The Israelites were on the path towards Canaan, like a straight arrow but then, in their unbelief, they were turned back. They missed the mark. Yet, as we can see in verse 24 above, the Lord did not cast the Israelites away, as a bent hunter's arrow. Rather, like the master fletcher. He spent 40 years straightening the arrow, until it was fashioned to fly straight. Unfortunately, as consequence of their unbelief, this work required that an entire generation nearly pass away. And then, with the Archer's release, the Israelites hit the mark

At times in life, because of our choices or circumstances, we may be like the Israelites; like bent arrows. But we should not fear. God is not only God. He is also our Lord, if we allow Him to be. He is loving and merciful and demonstrated through ultimate sacrifice that restoring relationship with His creation

is very important to Him. Might we say, He's very interested in straightening bent arrows like you and me. So when you feel like a bent arrow, remember to lay your life in the hands of the Master fletcher and trust Him as He straightens you for use in the Kingdom.

HOLINESS AS ART- ART FROM A BIBLICAL PERSPECTIVE

(Part 1 of 3)

Visual Art

"In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth" Gen. 1:1... we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus, unto good works... that we should walk in them." (Eph. 2:10)

The creativity and beauty God designed is displayed in heaven, in earth, and in the masterpiece of it all: mankind. Genesis 1:27 indicates "...in the image of God created he him: male and female created he them." God created in us a capacity for beauty and creativity, and the choice to use our talents to glorify Him or not. If we do choose to glorify God, we bring the splendor of the spirit of heaven to fallen earth. As N.T. Wright said, "...But the present world is also designed for something which has not yet happened. It is like a violin waiting to be played: beautiful to look at, graceful to hold - and yet if you've never heard one in the hands of a musician you wouldn't believe the new dimensions of beauty yet to be revealed. Perhaps art can show something of that, can glimpse the future possibilities, pregnant within the present time."

You wonder what I'm talking about? Come and see

The ultimate foundation for the creation and exploration of art is God. He is the Alpha and Omega, the first and the last of everything. He alone is the Master Artist, Designer, Musician, Creator, and Author. "And God saw everything that he had made. and, behold, it was very good..." (Gen. 1:31) In His wonderful creation is the whole human race who are made in the image of God with the same passion for beauty, song, architecture. rhythm, and so on. Why did He make us that way? It's apparently quite simple. God said "I have created him for my glory..." (Isa. 43:7) Our purpose is to glorify God and so should the results of the creativity that He put in us.

A simple definition of art: "Something that is created with imagination and skill that is beautiful or that expresses important ideas or feelings." Any type of art; the swelling sounds of music, a stunning painting, the intricacy of nature, a lovely poem, can stir our emotions and touch our feelings. It may stimulate

us to think and imagine. It can even unveil a deep conviction, a wonderful mystery or a lively hope.

The central purpose for art is worship! God created us to praise Him, and we should do so in actions, words, thoughts, and with the artistic talents He gave us. "... Worship the LORD in the beauty of holiness." (Ps. 29:2) Holiness is a way of life for the Christian. When we obey God's commands out of undivided love for Him and give Him full credit for our talents, when we surrender ourselves and fleshly desires, we can worship with a pure, clean heart. That is the beauty in holiness.

The Bible is full of art in many forms. We'll begin with visual art. In the Old Testament, the tabernacle was designed and inspired by God and used for Him alone. "And the LORD spake unto Moses... Let them make me a sanctuary; that I may dwell among them." (Exod. 25:1,8) Then God gave His Spirit to a few mortal human beings to make intricate components of the building.

He stirred people to give freely of their treasures for the glory of His tabernacle. He awaited the time when He could dwell among His chosen children. He directed Moses to fit people for the work

and gave him the blueprints for the wonderful place He had in mind. He called ordinary people to do extraordinary work!

"...the LORD hath called by name Bezaleel the son of Uri, the son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah; and he hath filled him with the spirit of God, in wisdom, in understanding, and in knowledge, and in all manner of workmanship; and to devise curious works, to work in gold, and in silver, and in brass, and in the cutting of stones, to set them, and in carving of wood, to make any manner of cunning work." (Exod. 35:30-33)

In the breastplate of the high priest's ephod were precious stones:

"And he made the breastplate of cunning work... and they set in it four rows of stones: the first row was a sardius, a topaz, and a carbuncle... and the second row, an emerald, a sapphire, and a diamond. And the third row, a ligure, an agate, and an amethyst. And the fourth row, a beryl, an onyx, and a jasper: they were enclosed in ouches of gold in their inclosings." (Exod. 39:8, 10-13) These stones symbolized the twelve tribes of Israel and how the high priest was to keep them near his heart.

Also, the priest's headpiece:

"And they made the plate of the holy crown of pure gold, and wrote upon it a writing, like to the engravings of a signet, HOLINESS TO THE LORD. And they tied unto it a lace of blue, to fasten it on high upon the mitre; as the LORD commanded Moses." (Exod. 39:30-31)

This would have been a reminder for the priest of the importance of being holy and pure before God. The same applies to us, "And ye shall be unto me a kingdom of priests, and an holy nation." (Exod. 19:6a) Holiness is the highest form of art in the sight of God! Holiness could be defined as such: Christ living in me, working out His plan through my surrendered obedient body and mind. May this be our prayer, that our talents would witness for Almighty God.

"And Moses did look upon all the work, and, behold, they had done it as the LORD had commanded, even so had they done it: and Moses blessed them...Then a cloud covered the tent of the congregation, and the glory of the LORD filled the tabernacle." (Exod. 39:43, 40:34) The Lord was pleased.

The tabernacle is not the

only form of visual art found in the Old Testament. In Neh. 1:1-3. Nehemiah is told about the devastation of Jerusalem. "The wall of Jerusalem also is broken down and the gates thereof are burned with fire." (Neh. 1:3b) But after working for fifty-two days through attacks, opposition, and ridicule, the walls were rebuilt and gates put in place. "So we built the wall; and all the wall was joined together unto the half thereof: for the people had a mind to work." (Neh. 4:6) Do we have the same approach to building the kingdom, to working together in harmony? In God's eyes, it's beautiful.

What about Solomon's great temple? Solomon was handed the task from his father, David, who had a passion for God that he had instilled in his son. Solomon. began to build on the second day of the second month in the fourth year of his reign. Around one million people worked on the temple until its seventh year completion, in the eleventh year of his reign in the eighth month. During that time, logs were milled out of Lebanon and massive stones hewn and brought to the building site. Solomon had skilled workmen construct a magnificent house for God, 60 cubits long and 20 cubits wide. The porch in front was 20 cubits square and 120 cubits high. All the furnishings were made with brass, pure gold, and cedar wood. Engravings of lilies, pomegranates, lions, cherubims, and palm trees were etched on the bowls, bases, baths, and accessories for use in the temple. Then "...when Solomon had made an end of praving, the fire came down from heaven and consumed the burnt offering and the sacrifices: and the glory of the LORD filled the house." (II Chr. 7:1) The Lord was again pleased with the willingness and desire of the workmen to use the gifts He gave them to create a spectacular place to worship Him in undefiled holiness.

Of all the splendor in the Old Testament, there is more to come that everyone can be a part of. Will you?

In Rev. 21, we read of a magnificent, glorious, beautiful-beyond-words city that God is preparing for the marriage supper of the Lamb. The twelve gates have the names of the twelve tribes written on them, the foundations of the city are the twelve apostles. Through

Jesus' covenant, the beauty of the Old Testament unites with the splendor of the New to create an eternal glorious home with Christ as the head of the corner, where the saints will live forever with the Lord!

And so where do Christians fit in this city? "To whom, coming as unto a living stone, disallowed indeed of men, but chosen of God and precious. Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house... acceptable to God by Jesus Christ... But ye are... a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people... Which in times past were not a people, but are now the people of God: which had not obtained mercy, but now have obtained mercy." (I Pet. 2:4,5, 9-10)

You see, through Jesus we are a part of the bride of Christ, part of an eternal home where the chosen children of Israel and the apostles of the Lamb abide! "Blessed are they that do his commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the city...Even so, come, Lord Jesus." (Rev. 22:14, 20b)

WHAT KEEPS YOU GOING FORWARD?

One of the favorite Bible passages for me lately has been in Job where Job says, "though he slay me, yet will I trust in him..." (Job 13:15) We all know the situation Job was in, what he lost and the problems he had to face. Even his wife who said, "Curse God and die." (Job 2:9)

What I want to know is what kept Job going forward in the middle of all of that? Even his friends were beating him over the head and blaming him for everything that was going on. Why did Job not give up?

I think sometimes we look at failure in a different way. We need to understand that failure sometimes redirects me to the path of faith. I have nowhere else to go.

I am not sure what God was doing with Job and how he was redirecting him, but I am quite sure that the latter days of Job's life were much richer because of what he had to go through.

In the Christian life, quitting is not an option. Unfortunately, many people quit and usually too soon. They quit this side of victory and never really experience the grace of God in their life.

Often when something terrible happens, a failure, or whatever, it makes way for a door to open I did not know existed. Sometimes when I fail in one area, I look around and another door opens I never would have thought was there. As I go through this new door, I begin to see something new from God as well as His grace.

It is not what stops me, but rather what keeps me going in spite of the obstacles that is my testimony. Anybody can stop, quit and just go back, but it takes a real man or woman of faith, that in spite of the obstacles they are faced with, they keep going on in the power and demonstration of the Holy Spirit.

Opposition does not mean stop. We often get the idea that if I am opposed by someone, that means I need to stop. Sometimes we think the opposition is just right and we are wrong. But that may not be the case. Opposition does not necessarily mean I am going in the wrong direction. Opposition sometimes means I am going in the right direction, which is why I have that opposition.

There are three sources of obstacles.

The first obstacle would be bad choices that we make. Whenever we make a choice, there is a consequence to go with it. Although we can choose whatever we want to, we cannot choose the consequence. Often times that consequence affects other people around us much more than it affects us. So sometimes, an obstacle is of my own creation.

Sometimes that obstacle is Satan's attack against me. I am going in God's direction and Satan wants to hinder me from continuing in that direction. I need to understand the agenda of Satan and how he is coming against me to keep me from experiencing God's agenda.

Another thing we do not often think of is that an obstacle may be God's discipline in our life. Maybe God is trying to discipline us in an area to fine-tune us to be more effective in our walk with Him. God might give us a little opposition to refine us and develop us into men and women of faith.

Opposition opens up the way for our faith to develop. If I never had any opposition, my faith would get weaker and weaker. It is that opposition in my life that strengthens my faith and brings my faith to the forefront of my life. God many times challenges me to discover what my faith in Him is all about.

One thing I really need in my Christian life is discernment. I need to be able to discern what is happening in my life and what the sources of the opposition I am facing are. An act of this discernment flows in a way to give me the answer to my problem. I cannot know the answer until I have completely defined the question. Many times. I need the discernment of the Holy Spirit to understand what is happening, but more than that, how I need to respond to a certain opposition in my life.

It is amazing to me as I think of Job in the Old Testament how that nothing around him, his circumstances, his friends, his family, particularly his wife, ever intimidated him in his walk with God. I am not sure I could have lasted through all that he lasted through. However, the interesting thing about Job is that it did not matter what was happening. It did not matter if he understood it or not, the thing that really mat-

tered was that he was going to keep his faith in God regardless of what would happen. That is a challenge to me today. No matter what is happening in my life, I need to allow my faith in God to have the priority that it deserves.

Many times I quit too soon and never experience the victory

that God had for me. The lesson of my life is to not quit, not allow the opposition to dominate my life or define who I am. Rather, let my faith in God determine who I am and where I am going and who I am going to be serving.

When alarms go off in our




- Is there unconfessed sin in my life?

- Are there unsurrendered worries in my heart?


Sin is sin and the Bible teaches us to admonish each other to pursue righteousness.
