In driver's education class in high school, I had heard that my instructor had the reputation of trying to trick his students into turning the wrong way down a one-way street. I knew the instructor as he also taught one of my math classes and this rumor didn't surprise me at all. However, it did rattle me a bit. A week or two into the class, he started teaching us how to watch for one-way streets ahead and, as he did, we could feel the anticipation of an attempted trick building. Sure enough, before long, with me at the wheel, he tried his ploy. But I didn't fall for it. Why? Because being forewarned, I had been paying special attention to his instructions on how to look for one-way streets.

and I didn't turn the wrong way. But several years later, I did turn the wrong way down a one-way street because I was lax in looking for the signs. If you've ever done this, you may recall from that time, very briefly entertaining a question in your mind as to why everyone else was going the wrong way, and then quickly realizing you are in the wrong and need to stop, turn around and go the right way.

Rather simple, isn't it? Perhaps in the matter of driving it is, but it may not always be so simple in areas of sin. While I wasn't misled by the driving instructor to turn the wrong way that day long ago, there have been many days in my life that I did turn the wrong way.

Scripture tells us that sin is deceitful. Unlike the instant

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shock and trepidation of realizing that we turned the wrong way down a one-way street, sin can be much more subtle, slowly creeping its way into our hearts and lives. Once it is established, the deception can take hold and cause our hearts to become callous and hardened and then enslave us to the extent that we become a justifier of our sin and even its defender.

"The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it?" Jer. 17:9

"But every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed. Then when lust hath conceived, it bringeth forth sin: and sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death." Js. 1:14-15

Whether on the road or in our hearts, there is only one way of correction. We have to first admit our error. Next we have to stop moving in the direction we had been and actively turn and go the right way. This is the essence of repentance. Repentance is sincere regret or remorse for our wrongdoing. As it is sincere, it is accompanied by admission of our iniquity followed by the correction of our course.

At times in life, most of us

have experienced being caught in a misdeed, then admitting our wrong, yet didn't try to fix the issue going forward. Why is this? Is it because we weren't sincerely repentant? Was it that we didn't really regret our wrong, we just regretted that we were caught? When we are sincerely repentant, our heart will desire the right way.

As the driving instructor taught us how to watch for one-way streets ahead, God's word teaches us to watch for snares, both that lie ahead as well as those that may already entangle us. As we learn how to identify the traps, His word and Holy Spirit teach us how to sincerely repent so that by His mercy and grace, we can be made free!

"Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path." Ps. 119:105

HOW DO I MAKE THE RIGHT DECISIONS?

The following is a loose transcription of a discussion between Zach Funk and Todd Castle in episode #002 of the Surrendered Soul Podcast of the same title. Zach and Todd are from the Dallas Center, lowa congregation.

Part 1 of 3 Practicing Rigorous Authenticity

Life is full of decisions. You might even say that life is a series of decisions. Some are easy, while others are more difficult. The results of these decisions vary greatly in their effect on our life and the lives of others. Some decisions will be life changing, even to the point where the destination of our souls is at stake.

So how do we make the right decision? How do we know if we are making the right decision? What if there isn't a wrong outcome to our decisions? Let's deep dive into this thought process.

There are three core principles that seem foundational to understanding how this works. The first is to practice rigorous authenticity (I John 1:7). The second is to surrender the outcome (Rom. 8:28; I Thes. 2:4; Col. 3:17). The third is to do the uncomfortable work (II Cor. 5:18). To be fair, there is a lot of overlap in these concepts, as there isn't really a clear delineation between them.

As we consider practicing rigorous authenticity, it's about going the extra mile in making sure that individuals you are communicating with are actually understanding the content, context, motive and meaning behind what you are talking about.

There are many times or situations where we are conditioned to accept the use of white lies. We hear a lie, and we just filter it, accept it and interpret what it means. We have gotten used to people lying to us. To a certain extent, we are conditioned to have you tell me what I want to hear rather than just telling me what is real. When you find someone that is real, truly authentic and transpar-

ent, it is very refreshing. Yet we may prefer to hear what is desirable to us as opposed to seeking the truth at all costs. Scripture talks a lot about walking in the light. "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts." (Ps. 139:23) This is being searched and known at a very core level; being authentic and real all the way through.

To walk in the light, is to walk real, even if it is going to make me look bad, or even if it is to my own detriment. Am I willing to lay my reputation down and walk authentically and be real? That is who we are to be as Christians. True followers of Jesus will practice rigorous authenticity.

It is our carnal nature to filter our responses. We try to look ahead at the consequences of the response before we respond, rather than just tell the truth and surrender the outcome. How is this going to sound? How are they going to receive it? What are they going to think about me after they hear it?

We are pretty good at telling the truth, but sometimes we may slant it to make it not sound as bad as it is or in some way, lead the hearer to a different conclusion than what the raw and real truth would allow. This is seen in various areas of life. We have come to expect this level of lying and duplicity in the field of sales, but does this permeate our brother-to-brother relationships and conversations?

The spirit of self-preservation pride is at the root of this duplicity. We respond to others with a subconscious slant of protecting our reputation and attempt to lead others to think more highly of us than would be justified. It is a mask that we put on and in truth, we have gotten comfortable wearing it. It is actually hypocrisy. So what does it look like to live a truly authentic and transparent life? How do I overcome the fear of the required vulnerability?

To live that authentic, to live that real and raw, requires a lot of vulnerability. This really gets to just how surrendered I am to Jesus and the work of the Holy Spirit in my life. Am I surrendered enough

to allow you to hurt me or to be hurt by anyone? Do I trust the Holy Spirit enough to surrender the outcome of any given conversation or situation? Am I willing to surrender what others think about me, how others see and perceive me? Am I willing to give up control of the outcome and surrender to the work of the Holy Spirit?

It comes down to this one question. Do I believe in and fully trust God? The purposeful surrendering of my security, my identity, of who I am as a child of God, to God. Another way to consider this is to allow Jesus to pull down the idol of the fear of man and replace it with His desire, the fear of the Lord. Vulnerability becomes a way of life for the true believer. Jesus is enough.

The fear of man was one of the biggest idols that I had to surrender to Jesus. One principle that has really been helpful for me is the stunning realization and truth that I am a son of God and that I can, without reservation or fear, trust that nothing can happen to me that doesn't first flow through my Father's fingers. Because my Father is good all the time, and only gives good gifts to His children (Matt. 7:11), nothing can or will ever happen to me that isn't for my ultimate good. The only prerequisite is that I actually am His son. He is able and willing to protect me in my raw vulnerability. God actually desires vulnerability for me because it exposes my weaknesses. It destroys self and lets Him do the work that He is wanting to do in my heart and life. We can rest in the identity of the righteousness that Jesus has imputed to us. It removes the fear and replaces it with peace. This cannot be overstated!

IS THAT REALLY WHAT IT SAID?

Whatever Jesus was, He certainly was not a religionist. Throughout his whole ministry, He came against the religionists who tried to modify His work to conform to their agenda. I wonder how many times Jesus really got tired of these religionists getting in His face and trying to get him to do that which was applicable to their religionist viewpoint?

Throughout His ministry, Jesus did what was necessary to help people who were hurting. One important thing we get from the life of Jesus is that He helped people despite some objections. I know we can get off balance with this idea of helping people and putting everything else aside, but an important thing in Jesus' life was reaching out to people who normally would not have been reached out to: people who the Pharisees would certainly have ignored and did on a consistent basis.

Consider, for example the parable of the Good Samaritan. The religionists ignored the needs of the hurting, while the Samaritan came and helped as best he could. The Samaritan had every reason not to help

but he helped anyway despite the inconvenience.

If you would listen to the Pharisees, you would never have enough time left over to do anything. They had so many rules and regulations and if you did not abide by all of them, you were an outcast. Just ask the blind man that Jesus healed (John 9).

Sometimes we get all caught up in what we should or should not do that we fail to have any time left over to do what needs to be done. That is the problem with religionists. If the Pharisees had known what Jesus was really doing, I do not think they would have objected to it. It appears that they were so focused on their agenda and their reputation that they could not see anything good in the life of Jesus. They looked on Him as a threat, and, of course, He was in the long run.

This brings me to the point that sometimes there is a danger of interpreting God's word in the context of our culture. At times, we might allow our culture, the religious aspect, to dictate what we can and cannot do. We are called to be followers

of Jesus. We need to have such a passion for lost people like Jesus had, that we will do anything and everything in order to reach them. We must not allow popular opinion to hinder us in any regard.

It was the apostle Paul who said, "For I could wish that myself were accursed from Christ for my brethren, my kinsmen according to the flesh" (Rom. 9:3). The fact of the matter is, Jesus already died and we are now messengers to go out into a lost world and tell people that the solution to their problem is Jesus Christ.

Sometimes I hear people quoting verses of scripture out of context. I guess the most infamous one to me is. "the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32). Usually, it is put in the political context. That could not be more misused or misinterpreted. The implication of that verse is the truth, which is, of course, Jesus Christ will make you free from the threats of the world around us. The freedom that we need is the freedom from all of these rules and regulations the religionists impose upon us in order to fulfill their agenda.

The saying goes that when something is repeated enough times, people begin to believe it. All you need to do is tell a lie over and over and over again and a certain group of people will begin believing that lie. Look back through history and see how many people have manipulated and dominated whole countries because of misrepresenting the truth. Simply put, a lie is twisting some aspect of the truth.

Jesus set the record straight that we are not here only to obey the laws as much as we are here to infiltrate our world and reach people who desperately need to be reached. The most desperate people are those who are ignored by the religionists. Just as the Pharisees ignored many people, their answer was that their rules and regulations do not allow them to do that, or they would. Well, of course they would.

No matter how many times Jesus explained what was happening, the Pharisees could not hear, because all they had in their ears was their rules and regulations in the sound of their own voice. If you study the Old Testament, you will find that the Pharisees, the Sadducees,

the scribes and all the religious leaders added to God's law over and over again until it was beyond the ability of the ordinary man to perform. Jesus Christ did not come to use the law to his advantage, but rather to fulfill the law and reach people that needed help.

Some people are so anxious to keep the letter of the law that they have somehow lost the spirit of the law. The law was never meant to enslave people, but rather direct them in a direction God wants them to go.


Often we need to step back


and ask, what is the reason for why I am placed here on earth? John's reason for joy was that he had seen God work and move in his life, and that He desired a close relationship with him!


Let's not get our focus off the true reason that we are here today! And if we can daily commune in that calling, we will live our lives in joy beyond anything this world can offer!


Let's not let our adversary steal our joy. Christ alone can bring true Joy! After all Christ is the author of JOY!
